	<p>Smoking Cessation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Presentation attached. • Q: Member asked is Vaping included in this with the stats A: Not currently, it is all on Tobacco • Q: Member asked when you call 811 do you have to ask for the smoke cessation specialist? A: It will be an RN who has had training in tobacco cessation. • Q: Member asked, do you have data on the age group you are seeing wanting to quit? A: Yes, we have age 15-74 • Q: How does a client get to see you? do they need to be referred? What about people from other communities besides YK? A: They can self-refer or referred by any member of the integrated care team. Currently the program is being rolled out in Yellowknife first in-person, but they can access through a virtual option. • Q: Member asked where are you located? A: We are at Primary care in the Liwegoati building as well as YPCC on Wednesday. • Q: Some of these resources are from about 25 years ago can some of the words be made more cultural such as you say quitting tobacco where tobacco is ceremonial maybe the wording can be changed not the concept. A: This feedback will be provided to the working group. We are in the process of adapting the booklet from the OMSC, which is reviewed annually and updated and has been vetted through patient groups in Ontario. The OMSC working group will look to include our community perspectives and patient perspectives in the development of new materials, particularly for the communities. Additionally, the Ottawa smoking cessation people from Ottawa will be coming in to train the staff to incorporate the new approach and to then be able to develop how this will be rolled out to more people. 	6:00	Dale Matheson

	<p>recognize the importance of that, and they are seeking out parent partners in that to be part of their regional communities as well that includes first nations. It is still an area where there is a gap and how that is shared. We are working on a website update where all these resources are available you can also get these resources when you meet with your physician or healthy families. They are also available in the baby bundle that every parent has access to.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Member asked, Is the baby bundle offered just in Yellowknife. It is available in every community in the NWT. How do families go about getting them in the communities? This program is offered through prenatal care. It is delivered in the communities Health centers by the CHNs and the Community Wellness workers most of the time. Some regions have set up a program where the healthy family's program is the support. <p>We can give a follow up: we can check who and how they are being delivered in your communities.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Member asked if you have updated trends with more recent info? Also do we still have lactation consultant? The baby bundles are given out by the health center CHN's in each community. If it is a normal pregnancy and no concerns, the CHN also provided most of the care to all prenatal clients until 36 weeks. Clients would also see a physician at least once a trimester. <p>At 36 weeks the client comes to YK to complete the remaining pregnancy with physicians at Liwegoati</p> <p>Lactation consultant has been hired as a territorial resource but is stationed in YK at this time. For clarification, there are more people with infant feeding knowledge and can provide support to families on infant feeding in our system that have completed training but have not certified. The territorial consultant will help support and be available if needed.</p>

We have been given some recommendations based on home and community care review across the territory, they are looking at expanding the hours of home care in the communities. For the June RWC meeting: Learn more about CBMH mental health training to help serve our homeless population. Currently: are offering some resources like assist, mental first aid and more. Some personal experiences and stories of what has transpired to others in the community were shared to articulate how members of the community have a history where they feel the trust has been broken and feelings of their serious and significant health concerns being ignored or minimized leading to poorer outcomes.</p> <p>The COO intends to increase community engagement and work with members to improve trust, including a focus on increased training and support to staff in providing culturally safe and anti-racist care.</p> <p>Meetings by COO and Director with both staff and community members in the coming months on-site in communities of Fort Resolution and Lutselk'e to appreciate the complexities of the relationships and what measurable steps can be taken to improve the care environment for all – these were acknowledged as priorities.</p>		
9.0	<p>Roundtable Updates - Community activities, questions, and concerns</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Members of the community have had trouble finding information on how much glasses were once you became 60. They called around and no one knew. R: Clear instructions on where to find this information will be sought and provided. Primary care phone system. A few members spoke up about difficulties getting through. R: COO provided update (also see COO Report) on this quality improvement project. Changes to how the lab books appointments are being experienced negatively for some members, especially if they need to have their blood work right away. R: This feedback will be passed on to the Director of Labs. – completed JT Substance use has been rising, can we add to the agenda for this year around harm reductions. Member spoke up about this happening to the black community as well, wanting to bring awareness to our community. Wondering what can be done. Member suggested to reach out to the RCMP as they are a great resource. R: Will look to see if we can include addictions services as part of our program update in the new year for CBMH. Nancy to share YK Resident Primary Care Reform Letter with members confidentially that will be going out to households in the next week.
